What the centennial marks

The U.S. Numbered Highway System received final approval on November 11, 1926. US 41 was part of that original system, so the route designation reaches its centennial in 2026.

Important: This is the anniversary of the numbered route designation, not a claim that every modern mile, alignment, bridge, or endpoint has remained unchanged for a century.

Naples to Copper Harbor

At corridor scale, original US 41 broadly connected Naples, Florida, and Copper Harbor, Michigan. Naples therefore belongs at the center of the original southern-endpoint story, while Copper Harbor carries the northern-endpoint story.

SOUTH **Naples**

Original broad southern endpoint anchor in the 1926 story.

NORTH **Copper Harbor**

Original broad northern endpoint story and modern northern finish.

The Tamiami Trail and the US 41 number have different histories

The Tamiami Trail was completed in 1928 as a Tampa-to-Miami road via Naples. The Naples-to-Miami corridor was not part of original US 41 in 1926.

Keeping the road-building timeline separate from the route-number timeline makes the modern South Florida start easier to understand.

How US 41 reached Miami

In June 1949, AASHO approved extending US 41 from Naples to Miami and replacing US 94 between those cities. Miami is therefore the modern southern start for Route41RoadTrip, while Naples remains central to the original 1926 route story.

One designation, many later route changes

Florida: Southern terminus, Everglades crossing, Gulf Coast city sequence, and the longest state chapter.

Georgia: Agricultural corridor, Middle Georgia city sequence, Atlanta metropolitan hinge, and north-Georgia handoff.

Tennessee: Tennessee River gateway, mountain and plateau transition, capital-city hinge, and the route's most important branch-identity chapter.

Kentucky: Compact western-Kentucky chapter and Ohio River approach.

Indiana: Ohio River continuation, Wabash Valley history corridor, long inland drive, and Chicago Southland approach.

Illinois: Chicago lakefront hinge and North Shore transition.

Wisconsin: Lake Michigan entry, freeway-based metropolitan corridor, Lake Winnebago and Fox Valley sequence, and Michigan-border approach.

Michigan: Upper Peninsula long-distance finish, Lake Superior chapter, Keweenaw bridge hinge, and northern terminus area.

Field-guide rule: Celebrate continuity of the route story without claiming every modern local alignment has carried US 41 continuously since 1926.

Use the right endpoint for the right question

1926

Naples

Original southern anchor in the broad 1926 corridor story.

1949

Miami

Joined US 41 later and serves as the modern southbound / northbound planning endpoint.

1926 + TODAY

Copper Harbor

Northern endpoint story and modern prepared finish.

Write the decisions that should survive even when the day changes.
